

When To Say Goodbye To Cleaning Products



Antibacterial Cleaners

Antibacterial cleaners have a shelf life of about one year. However, if the product is diluted or exposed to extreme temperatures, its effectiveness may be compromised sooner, reducing its ability to kill bacteria.



Laundry Detergent

Unopened laundry detergent begins to degrade after about nine months. Once opened, its shelf life is reduced to six months, after which it may not clean clothes as effectively as before.



Window Cleaner

Window cleaners generally remain effective for about two years. After this period, their ability to clean glass surfaces diminishes, which may result in streaks and reduced clarity on windows.



Spray Air Fresheners

Spray air fresheners lose their effectiveness after about two years. While they may still produce a scent, they won't be as strong or long-lasting, diminishing their ability to freshen up spaces.



Powdered Cleaning Products

Powdered cleaning products, especially those used by carpet cleaning technicians, tend to have a longer shelf life than their liquid counterparts. Their effectiveness remains intact over extended periods, making them a reliable choice for long-term use.



Hydrogen Peroxide

Hydrogen Peroxide, if unopened, can last up to one year. However, once opened, its shelf life significantly decreases and should be replaced after 60 to 90 days to ensure it remains effective.



Bleach

Bleach should be replaced after six months if it hasn't been used. As bleach degrades over time, its effectiveness in disinfecting surfaces decreases, making it less reliable for cleaning tasks after this period.



All-Purpose Cleaners

All-purpose cleaners start losing their effectiveness after two years. While they may still clean, they won't be as efficient in cutting through grime and dirt as they were when first purchased.
